- Approaching an animal 10x your size takes inner strength.
- · Requiring that animal do what you ask it to do is empowering.
- Taking care of that animal and the equipment used to do so, creates respect and responsibility.
- Feeds bags, saddles, muck buckets, hay bales and the like all require physical strength, the application of that strength exposes limitations that drive participants to push themselves for better.
- Riding a horse requires the participant to maintain balance on an unstable surface for extended amounts of time, this requires focus and muscle coordination.
- Reining requires hand-eye control and fine motor skills.
- Progressive lessons aide in goal setting and celebration of small victories.
- Skill building requires humility and the thirst for knowledge.
- Working with horses requires creative communication and is a lesson in interpersonal relationships.
